ELCOME to our Summer/Autumn edition of the

Loreto Spirituality Centre News.

The summer season is here again, and Llandudno is alive with people enjoying their holidays.

Set aside a little, on the Great Orme, Loreto Centre provides a quiet space for those coming on retreat, away from the hustle and bustle of daily life, to pause and rest awhile with God.



Over the last six months, we have hosted a number of groups, some for our programmed events, others using our facilities for their own event. Some groups have been coming for years. Others are new, as communities 'regroup' following the lockdown period, and look for a venue to meet.

We began the year with an international group of IBVM sisters making the full Spiritual Exercises of St Ignatius. This is part of a programme called Tertianship, which completes the time of formation in our congregation. As this retreat ended, our minds turned to the Lenten Season. Fr Nicholas King came to give a Triduum on 'Praying Lent in the year of St Matthew'. This was followed shortly by our Holy Week retreat – always a very special time for us here.

A new venture for us at the start of 2023 were our monthly Days of Prayer, which we have called Loreto Days. They take place on one Saturday every month, and we provide the participants with some material for reflection, plenty of quiet time and an opportunity for sharing for those who wish. Gardening Tips from Chris at Loreto Centre

This is an excellent tip for small gardens, and is something that Chris, our chef, has used here at the Centre.



Using a 4 litre empty milk container, turn onto its side, with the handle at the top and locate the centre seam. Cut approx.1cm above this seam. You can either brush or spray paint the larger, bottom container, this will attract maximum sunlight and so growth.

In the top part of the container, fill with compost, water well, using the handle as a watering channel, and leave the cap on for now to retain moisture. Now plant 2 lettuces per container, remove cap and place inside your painted bottom half of the container.



Chris has screwed his containers to a wall, freeing up floor space and utilising extra space for growing.

LORETO DAYS

These days were an initiative we tried out at the beginning of 2023.

One Saturday of every month, with the exception of July and August, we hold a quiet day of prayer. These days are an opportunity to come away for a few hours for some reflective time with God.

The day begins with coffee from 10am, for a 10.30 start. After some input or a reflection led by one of the Loreto Centre team, you are free to spend some quiet time alone in prayer. This is followed by a sharing group for those who wish. Otherwise you can simply take more time for yourself. After lunch (please bring your own packed lunch), there is a little more input, more quiet time and a final prayer. The day ends at 3.30, with tea for those who wish.

The days are free, but you are asked to make a donation of between £5 or £10 or whatever you feel you can afford. As always, please do not allow financial difficulties to keep you from coming to any of our events.

The dates of the Loreto Days for the rest of 2023 are:

Saturdays: 16 September, 21 October (see below), 11 November, 9 December.

Please note that the 21st October will take a different format.

It will be led by Steve Radley, who leads workshops on Visio Divina. We will be using our smartphone or camera as a window to encounter the divine within the ordinary.

'A GLORIOUS MISSION'

If you have been reading the last page of After two years, the sisters moved to the previous newsletters, you will have been introduced to our Foundress, Mary Ward, and to Teresa Ball, who joined the sisters in York in the 19th Century and founded the energy and determination, expanding the first Loreto School in Dublin. Following this, school, which grew to provide an excellent first Loreto School in Dublin. Following this, other schools were founded in Ireland, all with the same name, and in time, the Loreto branch of the Congregation spread abroad.

How did it come to England?

In the mid-19th Century, Manchester was full of Irish immigrants, living in poverty and hardship, and no education available for the children. This was a great concern to a Parish priest of the diocese of Salford, Canon Laurence Toole, who made contact with Mother Teresa Ball, to request her to send some of her nuns to found a school in his parish.

Sr Anne Hickey was appointed superior of a small group of sisters, who came to Manchester in October 1851. They were full of joy as they began this new mission. In her first letter to Teresa Ball, Anne described their first impressions, saying 'This is a Glorious Mission, all ours in greatest glee . . . '

Not all was glorious, however, as the nuns faced the hostility of the anti-Catholic neighbourhood. Initially, they had lodgings at the Presbytery, and had to face humiliation from the locals on their daily walk to the school. Their eccentric dress drew attention to them, and they were jeered and laughed at, and worse . . . Thankfully, the nuns had a sense of humour, and continued to work with joy, but the beginnings of this mission were far from easy.

lodgings on the site of the school. In 1856, a new Superior, Mother Alphonsa Ellis was appointed and continued the work with education for the Catholic children in the



Loreto College continued as a school until the 1970s, when reorganisation of education in Manchester necessitated it to become a Sixth Form College, thriving to this day.



Following the Irish trend, more Loreto Schools were founded in England, and in 1919 some of the sisters moved to Wales, to make a foundation in Llandudno.
