ELCOME to our Winter/Spring edition of the Loreto Spirituality Centre News.

A very happy New Year to you all! We hope that 2024 will bring peace to our hearts, our homes and to the world around us.

In our troubled times, when nothing feels secure and the future is uncertain, it is easy to lose ourselves and our orientation in life. We have just celebrated the Feast of the Epiphany, and seen how the Magi, losing sight momentarily of the Star, found themselves in the palace of Herod. Only when they set off on their journey again, the Star led them to Jesus, where they rejoiced with 'exceeding great joy' (Mt 2:10), and having left their gifts, they returned home 'by another road'. Their encounter with Jesus had given them clarity as to the way forward, had met the longings of their heart, brought order to their ideas, and focused their aims. They came in tumult, but went home in peace.

This is so often, in our experience, the journey made by people who come on a retreat. Some time away provides them with a space where they can hear God. And once we listen intently to God, we see everything differently and go home another way.

Pope Francis has dedicated 2024 a year of Prayer, in preparation for the Jubilee year in 2025, bearing the theme 'Pilgrims of Hope'. We are very mindful of the role that a Spirituality Centre can play in this invitation, and hope that some of you will take advantage of the opportunities that these centres offer across the country, as well as online.

Over the last year, as well as our usual Preached and Individually Guided retreats, we offered some themed events to cater for a wider population in our changing times. The *'Finding Life in an Era of Change'* weekend proved very popular. It offered time and space for quiet reflection, and gentle, mindful body movement to promote healing, a healthy balance and self-care. Our *Visio Divina* retreat encouraged those who enjoy photography to reflect on God in all that they see through the lens of their camera or phone. *Space to Grieve* offered those recently bereaved to come together, share their stories, and support each other through a difficult time, through prayer and companionship.

These retreats will be offered again in 2024. We will also hold a weekend on Discernment, reflecting on how we make choices in life, using the vision and writings of Mary Ward to help us. Other events will include a retreat using Poetry to inspire our prayer, and another using the methods of Bibliodrama to engage with the Gospel scenes. Loreto Days of Prayer have also proved popular, for local – and not so local – people. Some have travelled far to come for a few hours of space and prayer on a Saturday, in the middle of a busy life. These days will continue.

New ways to travel 'home' begin within, in prayerful encounter with Christ, where we rejoice with 'exceeding great joy'. In the Spiritual Exercises, Ignatius invites us to 'the Task of Consolation' (224).

A retreat encourages us to return home to respond to this invitation, as Pilgrims of Hope who address the needs of our times. Our own hope is that Loreto Centre, in some small way, can contribute to this in our own world.

Our prayer for the year ahead, may be an echo of that of one of Ignatius' closest companions, Pierre Favre.

With great devotion and new depth of feeling, I hope and beg, O God, that it finally be given me To be the servant and minister of Christ the consoler, The minister of Christ the redeemer,

The minister of Christ the healer,

The liberator, the enricher, the strengthener.

To be able through you to help many -

To console, liberate and give them courage;

To bring them light not only for their spirit But also for their bodies,

And bring as well other helps to the soul and body Of each and every one of my neighbours.

FIRST PROFESSION OF VOWS

On Sunday 10 September 2023, in the Bar Convent in York, I made my first profession of vows as a Mary Ward sister with the Congrgation of Jesus. It was a day full of joy and grace and, I'm sure, the beginning of an exciting new adventure with Christ.

My journey began in the Northwest of England. I was born into an Irish Catholic family in the Liverpool Diocese and I attended the local Catholic primary and secondary schools and Sixth Form College. My parents were active participants in parish life so I was often around the church growing up and, as a teenager, I became involved in my own right. I started to run a youth music group in the parish and went to Lourdes with the diocesan pilgrimage each year, later also becoming involved in the Diocesan Pastoral Council. It was natural for me to want to study Theology and I was fortunate enough to be accepted into Oxford to do this, specialising in Biblical Studies.

Oxford was a world away from my previous experiences, which wasn't always easy, but it also opened new horizons for me. The possibility of entering religious life had been there as a child but I now started to think more about careers and the world of work. Straight after university I began work as a Theology teacher and boarding tutor at Prior Park College in Bath. I thought I might stay for a year or two; I ended up there for twenty years! I loved life in the boarding community and ended up as housemistress. Later, I became Academic Head of Sixth Form and finally Senior Deputy Head. It was a wonderful life in a beautiful place. I started to take groups of students to Lourdes with the Clifton Diocese and Catholic Association, led a pilgrimage to the Holy Land and trained as a spiritual director. In many ways I was very happy, but I was increasingly aware of a niggle deep inside which suggested that, whilst this life was good, there might be something more I was being called to do and to be.

I walked parts of the Via Francigena and 'bumped into' St Ignatius of Loyola and the Jesuits en route. My attraction to this spirituality led me to Mary Ward and I eventually bit the bullet and left Prior Park College in December 2019, becoming a postulant in London in March 2020. Three weeks later, the whole country was in lockdown! It was not a conventional introduction to religious life but in some ways it softened the blow of so much change. I moved to Cambridge and volunteered at the University Chaplaincy for a year, offering support and companionship to international students who couldn't travel home and whose lives had moved almost entirely online. Finally, in September 2021, I moved to Vienna to begin my two-year noviciate.

Having a European Noviciate is relatively new for the Congregation of Jesus but it means that, from the beginning of my religious life, I have been gifted with a deep sense of being part of an international body of woman labouring with Christ in the world. I lived with sisters from Germany, Romania, Slovakia and Czechia and travelled to many different countries during this time. I completed placements in a home for older sisters, a residential homeless project and a young offenders' prison as well as working in a soup kitchen and giving Bible classes to the English-speaking Catholic community in Vienna. The noviciate is in English but I managed to learn a few words of German along the way.



The whole noviciate community travelled from Vienna to be in York for my vows weekend. They joined sisters from the English CJ and the IBVM, as well as my family and friends. With so many travelling great distances, we took over the guest house at the Bar Convent and were fortunate to be able to enjoy the garden there in the glorious late summer weather. The Mass on Sunday morning was celebrated by Fr Nicholas King SJ, assisted by Fr Dominic O'Toole CSsR and Fr Pablo de Lima. Our intercessions were read in six different languages to reflect our global community and musical accompaniment was provided both by sisters and former colleagues from Prior Park; many parts of my life coming together for this special moment. Of course, there was also a splendid lunch enjoyed by all afterwards in one of the Bar Convent's Conference Rooms.



I have now moved back in the English Province and am currently undertaking the 10-week course in St. Beuno's on Spiritual Direction and Retreat-Giving. After that, who knows . . . I look forward to a new mission and to seeing where these steps on a new path with Christ may lead.
