There will be plenty of time for discussion and questions, and it is designed so that if you cannot attend the full three days, it is possible to come for only a part and still benefit from a full module. Reflection on Living Theology 2024 at Loreto Centre

Faith is, in part, an intellectual exercise. We may have questions about our church, scripture and doctrine and how these integrate with our daily lives and the society we live in. As someone whose formal religious education ended aged 16 with GCSE R.E, I'm curious about theology. While I enjoy a rich spiritual life in a caring church community, my theological knowledge is lacking. Enter Living Theology! This is a vibrant, engaging weekend of talks relevant to theology of daily life with opportunities for reflection and discussion. Last year, 2024, marked the 10th year of the Living Theology weekend in the Loreto Spirituality Centre, Llandudno. The venue offers tranquillity, a very warm welcome and a picturesque coastal location.

The format involves a key note lecture which is attended by all on Friday evening, then 3 small group talks on Saturday and Sunday which are chosen from a list of available courses. Interspersed with this are regular coffee breaks and a delicious, generous lunch. There's also ample time in the evenings to chat with others, relax, watch a film or enjoy a short walk by the sea or up the slopes of the Great Orme.

Karen Eliason, from the team at St Beuno's, gave the excellent, inspiring key note talk on Old Testament Listening Ideals. Starting with the Shema, the beautiful Hebrew prayer which opens Jewish prayer with the words "Hear, O Israel," we were introduced and led through the theme and power of listening in Deuteronomy and for Moses. A highlight for me was discovering, through Karen's talk, the transformative power of listening through listening with openness, attention and positive regard for the other. This has direct relevance for me in my job and I suspect will be helpful for many others in their daily lives, particularly in our increasingly polarised society.

Also topical was "Liberation Theology: origins and enduring relevance," a very engaging course given by Ethna Regan CHF, Associate Professor of Theology and Ethics at Dublin City University. This gave an enlightening historical perspective of the recognition of those experiencing economic poverty which is inevitably due to injustice. Their position as oppressed peoples and the call to all of us to notice, stand in solidarity and work to end economic inequality encouraged discussion. Particularly enlightening for me was learning that one of the first advocates of the underprivileged lived and wrote in the 1500s, Bartolome de Las Casas, a Dominican, and perhaps the first academic activist. The course took us right up to the present day with reflecting on Pope Francis' encyclical "Fratelli Tutti", including the metaphor of the Church as a Field hospital. We also reflected on the woundedness of the church, particularly on the institutional abuse that has occurred. Learning about Liberation Theology gave me some tools to face dealing with injustice. The process of reflecting on our reality in the light of the gospels, scrutinising the signs of the times, particularly spoke to me.

In his illuminating course, "God East and West," Mike Barnes SJ explored the two different types of spiritual languages: the prophetic and the mystical through Hindu, Sikh and Christian texts. The commonality of "the Word" as a manifestation of God was discussed in this interactive course, we were encouraged to express our interpretations of the texts in this wonderfully challenging exploration of prophets and mystics who teach us about God. For me, this gave a great foundation for inter-religious dialogue.

Overall, this weekend provides fuel and nourishment for everyday life. It inspires and encourages. It opens up possibilities. I'd recommend the Living Theology weekend to anyone curious and keen to explore their faith, to those who would like to hear and share ideas in a friendly, supportive and accessible setting.

LORETO LIANDUDNO – THE FOUNDATION PART 2

In the last newsletter (July 2024) we outlined the history of the Loreto Sisters' presence in Llandudno from its beginning to the late 20th Century. If you haven't seen it, you will find it on our website. We pick up the story . . .

In 1970, the numbers in the novitiate no longer warranted a large building, following Vatican II's encouragement of the laity to a full participation of the Church's mission. As a result, part of the building was developed to accommodate groups for the spiritual formation of the laity.

Also in 1970, it was decided to close the boarding school, there being less need, and the Diocese of Menevia acquired the property for a Middle (9-13) School, for Catholic children in the area. The school continued for over ten years, but when numbers decreased, neither the Local Authority or Diocese could support it financially any longer.

In 1987 the buildings were reacquired by Loreto and it was decided to expand the work of the Centre into

Clifton Lodge and The Hall for self-catering options for "quiet time", retreats, and day meetings. Early in the 1990s also, St Buenos' Outreach asked to use the lower part of Eithinog for its Ignatian Spirituality programme in this part of the Diocese.

Anyone who came this way in the 2010s saw the enormous expansion. The building and refurbishment which took place, resulted in the building of Loreto House and the subsequent establishment of Loreto Spirituality Centre in the old Convent building.

If walls could speak, they would tell of the lives and dedication of the generations of sisters who welcomed the boarders, children on holiday, other sisters from across the world, and then retreatants to the Spirituality Centre. Today, they would also tell us of the dedication of all the staff who work at the Centre, and those who work at Loreto House, looking after some of those sisters at the last stages of their lives.
